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1. EXECUTIVE SUMMARY


Ali Yavar Jung National Institute of Speech and Hearing Disabilities (Divyangjan), Mumbai (AYJNISHD(D)), a Society registered under the Societies Registration Act, 1860 (Act XXX of 1860) was established on 9th August 1983. It is an autonomous organization under the Department of Empowerment of Persons with Disabilities (Divyangjan), Ministry of Social Justice and Empowerment, Government of India, New Delhi. The summary of the significant activities and achievements of AYJNISHD(D), its Regional Centres (RCs) and Composite Regional Centres for Skill Development, Rehabilitation and Empowerment of Persons with Disabilities (Divyangjan) (CRCs) for the year 2022-23 is given below.


- ➤ The Institute and its RCs served 32793 new clients and 84028 follow up clients at its clinics and through outreach and extension services. The support services offered to the new and follow up clients were 374286.
- ➤ The Institute and its RCs distributed 14186 aids and appliances to 8936 beneficiaries comprising 5458 males, 3478 females, 3605 children and 1722 persons above the age of 60 years under ADIP scheme. Institute held 103 camps under ADIP scheme (details in Chapter-8).
- ➤ Under the long term training programmes, the Institute and its RCs enrolled 386 candidates in various courses and under the short term training programmes/webinars, the Institute conducted 101 programmes for 10938 beneficiaries.
- ➤ The Institute has Disability Information Line (DIL) an IVRS based 24 hours telephonic information service for the Persons with Disabilities all over India. During the reporting year, DIL received 55504 calls.
- ➤ The Institute issued 1783 letters in Hindi and 2448 in English. Total 223 documents were issued in bilingual under Official Language Act 1963 Section 3 (3).
- ➤ Government of Maharashtra approved AYJNISHD(D), Mumbai to issue hearing disability certificate from August, 2016. During the reporting year, 362 persons were issued hearing disability certificates.
- ➤ 1153 children with hearing disability have been benefited with Cochlear Implantation including 1150 under ADIP and 3 under CSR funds during the year 2022-23. Total 219 hospitals are empaneled for Cochlear Implant surgeries across the country.
- ➤ The centrally Air-conditioned library of AYJNISHD(D), Mumbai added several national and international books and journals to its collection. It has 18006 reading material including 2041 Hindi books, 1385 bound issues of back volumes of journals.


- During the reporting year, Cross Disability Early Identification and Intervention Centre (EIC) served 340 children with hearing impairment, intellectual disability, autism spectrum disability, low vision, multiple disability & cerebral palsy and 76510 support services were provided.
- ➤ During the reporting year, the Composite Regional Centre for Skill Development, Rehabilitation & Empowerment of Persons with Disabilities (Divyangjan), Bhopal served 1289 new clients, 9671 follow up clients and 29366 support services at the Centre and through camps. The Centre distributed/fitted 287 aids/appliances to 168 beneficiaries
- ➤ The Composite Regional Centre for Skill Development, Rehabilitation & Empowerment of Persons with Disabilities (Divyangjan), Ahmedabad served 1940 new clients, 6868 follow up clients and provided 56912 support services at the Centre and through camps. The Centre conducted 24 assessment camps in which 1608 persons benefited. The Centre distributed/fitted 936 aids and appliances to 725 beneficiaries.
- ➤ During the reporting year, Composite Regional Centre for Skill Development, Rehabilitation & Empowerment of Persons with Disabilities (Divyangjan), Nagpur served 20365 new clients, 15924 follow up clients and 98368 support services were provided at the Centre and through camps. The Centre distributed/fitted 296 aids/appliances to 152 beneficiaries at various camps and centre.
- ➤ Western regional colorful cultural event "Divya Kala Shakti: Witnessing the Abilities in Disabilities" was organized by Department of Empowerment of Persons with Disabilities (Divyangjan), Ministry of Social Justice and Empowerment, Government of India and hosted by the AYJNISHD, Mumbai. The event was inaugurated by Chief Guest Shri. Bhagat Singh Koshyari, the Hon'ble Governor of Maharashtra in the presence of Guest of Honour Ms. Anjali Bhawra IAS, Secretary, and Shri Rajesh Kumar Yadav, IAS, Joint Secretary of Ministry of Social Justice and Empowerment, Govt. of India. 86 children and youth with different disabilities from the states in the western region such as Maharashtra, Goa, Madhya Pradesh, Gujarat, Rajasthan, Chhattisgarh, Daman & Diu participated in this event.
- ➤ The Institute opened NIRAMAYA registration counter at HQ, Mumbai, the scheme which provides affordable Health Insurance to persons with disabilities.
- ➤ During the reporting year Rehabilitation Services made available through RRC, ALIMCO at AYJNISHD, Mumbai and its CRCs at Ahmedabad and Bhopal.
- > The Institute made Clinical Services available on Saturdays and Sundays also.
- ➤ Union Minister of State, Ministry of Social Justice and Empowerment, Pratima Bhoumik, visited AYJNISHD, Mumbai on 29th December 2022. As part of 'Azadi Ka Amrit Mahotsav', Minister, unveiled the information display about the "Unique ID for Persons with Disabilities" (UDID) at the institute. It is a project which is being implemented by the Ministry of Social Justice and Empowerment, Government of India with a view of creating a National Database for PwDs, and to issue a Unique Disability Identity Card to each person with disabilities for availing all the schemes and facilities for PwDs under Govt. of India.




GRAPHICAL PRESENTATION OF VARIOUS SERVICES PROVIDED BY AYJNISHD (D) DURING LAST THREE YEARS


































2. ORGANIZATIONAL CHART OF AYJNISHD(D)





3. THE INSTITUTE, ITS CENTRES & ACTIVITIES



Ali Yavar Jung National Institute of Speech and Hearing Disabilities (Divyangjan) [AYJNISHD(D)], a Society registered under the Societies Registration Act, 1860 (Act XXX of 1860) was established on 9th August 1983. It is an autonomous organisation under the Department of Empowerment of Persons with Disabilities (Divyangjan), Ministry of Social Justice and Empowerment, Government of India, New Delhi. The Institute is located at K.C. Marg, Bandra Reclamation, Bandra (West), Mumbai - 400050, on a land area of 19324 sq.mt. and plinth area of 6624 sq.mt.

3.1 Mission

The Memorandum of Association of AYJNISHD(D) has the following aims and objectives:

- * To conduct, sponsor, coordinate or subsidise research into all aspects of education and rehabilitation of the persons with hearing handicap.
- * To undertake, sponsor, coordinate or subsidize research into biomedical engineering leading to the effective evaluation of aids or suitable surgical or medical procedures or development of new aids.

- * To undertake or sponsor the training of trainees, teachers, employment officers, psychologists, vocational counsellors and such other personnel as may be deemed necessary by the Institute for promoting education, training and rehabilitation of the persons with hearing handicap.
- * To distribute or promote or subsidize the manufacture of prototypes and distribution of any or all aids designed to promote any aspect of education, rehabilitation and therapy for persons with hearing handicap.

The Institute has four Regional Centres and three Composite Regional Centres for Skill Development, Rehabilitation and Empowerment of Persons with Disabilities (Divyangjan) which are as follows -

- 2) Regional Centre, Noida was established in 1986. It is functioning at NIEPID Building, Plot No.44-A, Block -C, Sector -40, Gautam Budh Nagar, Noida -201 301.
- 3) Regional Centre, Secunderabad was established in 1986. It is functioning in its own building adjacent to NIEPID Campus at Manovikas Nagar, Bowenpally, Secunderabad -500 009.
- 4) Regional Centre, Janla was established in 1986 in collaboration with the Government of Odisha. It is functioning in its own building at Janla, Dist. Khurda, Odisha 752 054.
- 5) Composite Regional Centre (CRC) for Skill Development, Rehabilitation & Empowerment of Persons with Disabilities (Divyangjan), Bhopal is a service model initiated by the Department of Empowerment of Persons with Disabilities (Divyangjan), Ministry of Social Justice & Empowerment, Govt. of India, established on 14th August 2000. The Centre is functioning under the administrative control of AYJNISHD(D) since February 2006. It is functioning in its own building at Punarvas Bhawan, Khajuri Kalan Road, Post Piplani, Bhopal 462 021.
- 6) Composite Regional Centre (CRC) for Skill Development, Rehabilitation & Empowerment of Persons with Disabilities (Divyangjan), Ahmedabad, Gujarat was established on 16th August 2011 and functioning under the administrative control of AYJNISHD(D). It is functioning in the building allotted by Govt. of Gujarat at Bhikshuk Gruh Campus, G.I.D.C., Odhav, Ahmedabad 382 415.
- 7) Composite Regional Centre (CRC) for Skill Development, Rehabilitation & Empowerment of Persons with Disabilities (Divyangjan), Nagpur, Maharashtra was established on 13th October, 2015 and functioning under the administrative control of AYJNISHD(D) from 1st May, 2020. It is functioning at Krida Prabodhini Hall, Yashwant Stadium, Dhantoli, Nagpur 440 012.

According to World Health Organization (WHO) by 2050 nearly 2.5 billion people are projected to have some degree of hearing loss and at least 700 million will require hearing rehabilitation. Hence there is a need based usage of advanced technology applications for rehabilitation of persons with speech and hearing challenges.

AI-powered applications can assess and track a person's progress, providing tailored exercises and therapies. Telemedicine enables real-time consultations with specialized auditory verbal therapists, audiologists, and speech therapists, transcending distance and geographical limitations. Wearable devices can monitor vital health metrics and provide instant feedback, empowering individuals to actively engage in their rehabilitation journey.

Individuals can undergo hearing assessments and receive adjustments to their hearing devices through online platforms, eliminating the need for frequent visits to clinics.

For individuals with severe speech and language impairments, technology has paved the way for augmentative and alternative communication solutions. Auditory Verbal Therapy using AAC devices, ranging from simple picture boards to sophisticated tablets, provide a means for nonverbal individuals to express themselves. 5. HUMAN RESOURCE DEVELOPMENT



AYJNISHD(D), Mumbai along with its Regional Centres at Kolkata, Secunderabad, Noida and Janla, Odisha conducts Doctoral, Postgraduate, Graduate, Undergraduate, Post Graduate Diploma, Diploma and Certificate level courses for generating the required human resource for offering rehabilitation services to Divyangjan. The human resource development programme in the field of rehabilitation of Divyangjan are recognized by the Rehabilitation Council of India, New Delhi and/or Universities. Details of the courses being conducted are given below. The number of students enrolled course wise is given in Appendix -I.

7. SERVICES



The Institute is dedicated to offering a wide spectrum of services aimed at addressing the needs of individuals with speech and hearing disabilities. Functioning as both a training and research hub, we are committed to delivering these services with utmost excellence, ensuring accessibility for individuals in both rural and urban settings. Our approach is truly interdisciplinary, as we bring together a diverse team of professionals, including Audiologists, Speech-Language Pathologists, Special Educators, Psychologists, Social Workers, Vocational Counsellors, ENT Specialists, Paediatricians, and Neurologists. This collaborative team approach enables us to provide holistic rehabilitation services that encompass diagnostic, therapeutic, educational, and vocational aspects, all aimed at enhancing the lives of those we serve.

The Institute plays a vital role in disseminating valuable information and documentation resources while distributing educational materials to the public. These resources encompass a range of crucial topics, including prevention, early identification, early intervention, parent training, and the effective utilization of hearing aids, among others. During the reporting year, the Institute provided assistance to an impressive 32,793 new cases and extended support to 84,028 follow-up cases across its headquarters (HQ), regional centres (RCs), and various outreach camps. This represents a noteworthy increase compared to the 33,752 new cases and 57,141 follow-up cases served in the preceding year of 2021-22. For a more detailed breakdown, please refer to Appendix - III for comprehensive statistics and insights.

7.1 Hearing Assessment & Hearing Aid Fitting

Our commitment to cutting-edge technology is evident in our approach to hearing assessment and hearing aid fitting. We employ state-of-the-art tools and techniques to ensure precise evaluation. Our services extend to individuals across various age groups, including new-borns and infants, as we assess their hearing acuity with utmost care and precision. In addition, we offer thorough testing and fitting services for miniature



behind-the-ear hearing aids, catering to eligible individuals. As part of our mission to support those in need, the Institute actively implements the Government of India's Scheme of Assistance to Disabled Persons for Purchase/Fitting of Aids & Appliances (ADIP). Through this initiative, we provide hearing aids and custom-made ear moulds to eligible individuals at no cost, ensuring accessibility to essential aids and appliances for those who require them most.

During the reporting year, 36195 number of persons underwent audiological evaluations as compared to 32378 persons during the year 2021-22. Further 14186 hearing aids were fitted and 5849 ear moulds were prepared during the year 2022-23 as compared to 15694 hearing aids and 5255 ear moulds during the year 2021-22 (details given in Appendix - III).

7.2 Issue of Hearing Disability Certificate

Govt. of Maharashtra approved AYJNISHD(D) as an authorised centre for the issue of hearing disability certificate vide its order dated 17th July, 2016. Following is the recognised board to issue hearing disability certificate.

During the reporting year, the Institute issued 362 hearing disability certificates to persons with hearing impairment in comparison to 407 certificates in the previous year.

7.3 Speech & Language Assessment & Therapy



Institute is equipped with advanced facilities designed to assess the speech and linguistic proficiency of individuals with speech and hearing disabilities. We embrace cutting-edge technology, including computer-assisted assessment and intervention tools, to enhance the quality of our services. In addition, we have dedicated resources and programs geared towards home-based interventions and comprehensive parent training programs. During the reporting year, 10,748 cases

registered for speech and language evaluation and 31,954 individuals benefiting from speech therapy sessions as compared to 12,013 cases registered for evaluation and 25,126 individuals receiving speech therapy sessions during the previous year of 2021-22. Detailed information can be found in Appendix - III for a comprehensive overview of our activities and their impact.

7.4 Psychological Assessment & Therapy

Institute offers a wide range of diagnostic services, including developmental assessment, intelligence testing, personality assessment, neuropsychological testing, and human resource

assessment. In addition to these vital assessments, we provide comprehensive psychotherapeutic services that encompass various psychotherapies, guidance and counselling, and psycho-educational interventions. During the reporting year, we registered a significant increase in the number of individuals seeking psychological evaluation, guidance, and counselling, with 3,700 new cases benefiting from our services. This marks a substantial rise



compared to the 1,558 cases registered in the preceding year of 2021-22. For more detailed statistics and insights, please refer to the information provided in Appendix - III $\dot{}$

7.5 Educational Guidance



The Institute provided guidance on various aspects of education to 9171 parents of children with hearing impairment during the year 2022-23 as compared to 8464 parents of children with hearing impairment during the year 2021-22 (details given in Appendix - III).

7.6 Socio-Economic Rehabilitation Services

The Institute extends comprehensive support to individuals with speech and hearing disabilities through its Socio-Economic Rehabilitation Department and Regional Centers. Our dedicated team assesses employability, offers vocational counseling, provides valuable career guidance, and assists in the placement of these individuals.

In collaboration with voluntary organizations, we conduct vocational training programs for adults with hearing impairment, equipping them with valuable skills. Furthermore, we offer orientation training to Vocational Counselors, Placement Officers, Personnel Officers, Rehabilitation Officers, and Social Workers to enhance their expertise in supporting the hearing-impaired community. Recognizing the importance of digital skills, we



also conduct computer training programs for students with hearing impairment at AYJNISHD(D), Mumbai, and our Regional Centres. Embracing the digital age, the Institute has introduced online referral services to facilitate the employment of individuals with hearing disabilities in vacancies reserved specifically for them. We are committed to empowering individuals with hearing impairment to achieve their career aspirations and lead fulfilling lives.

During the year under report 1939 persons were provided with vocational counselling and guidance as compared to 2819 persons during the year 2021-22 (details given in Appendix - III).



7.7 Information and Documentation Services

The Information and Documentation Services serve as a crucial bridge connecting AYJNISHD(D) with both its direct and indirect beneficiaries. These services are driven by the core objectives of acquiring, assimilating, and disseminating information to individuals and organizations dedicated to addressing the challenges of speech and hearing impairment. The Information and Documentation Centre undertakes a range of activities that play a pivotal role in achieving these objectives.

7.7.1 Computer Section

Computer Section facilitates computerization process by development of software needed for activities of the Institute, identifying and recommending suitable ready-made software packages, recommending suitable hardware, coordinating internet services and hardware maintenance services, providing training to staff as and when needed and providing help and support in data processing work. Following softwares are installed/used for various activities -

- Software for clinical services to PWDs
- 2. SOUL software for automation of library services
- 3. Tally-ERP software for accounting work at HQ, RCs and CRCs
- 4. eTDS for tax calculation
- 5. Software for pay and related work
- 6. Software for result preparation, mark list and certificate for courses conducted by RCI
- 7. Online admission system for the various courses run by the Institute.
- 8. Accounting Package of Ministry of Finance.

Internet service is made available in the library, hostel and in all the departments. Security software is in place.

This section plays a vital role in maintaining and curating the Institute's official website, www.ayjnihh.nic.in. The website serves as a comprehensive repository of information, offering extensive insights into the Institute's services and activities. Furthermore, it serves as an invaluable resource for information on speech and hearing impairments, along with rehabilitation measures. The website is a treasure trove of knowledge, covering a wide array of topics, including early identification, prevention, diagnosis, intervention, and assistance for individuals with speech and hearing disabilities, as well as their families. Keeping our stakeholders well-informed, we regularly update the website with the latest news and event details from the Institute, ensuring that visitors have access to the most current information.

Computer Section coordinates Biometric Attendance System (BAS) and support e-procurement process. To provide support to Cochlear Implant Services, a website – www.adipcochlearimplant.in is maintained by the Institute.



7.7.2 Library

The centrally air-conditioned library of AYJNISHD(D) can accommodate sixty students. It has 18006 reading material including 2041 Hindi books, 1385 bound issues of back volumes of journals. The Institute has subscribed 18 multi-site online e-journals for HQ & RCs and 155 open access journals, which reduced the cost and space required to store hard copies. Internet and Wi-Fi facility is made available to staff and students of AYJNISHD(D) to access Digital Library of AYJNISHD(D) and e-resources (N-LIST) of the library. The reprography facility is available during working hours of the Institute for staff, students and research scholars.

7.7.3 Disability Information Line (DIL)

The Disability Information Line (DIL) stands as a vital IVRS-based telephonic information service designed to offer comprehensive insights into various disabilities. This service is a reliable source for disability-related information, covering topics such as causes, prevention, diagnosis, intervention/treatment, aids and appliances, education, employment, service providers, government schemes, and concessions. To enhance accessibility and cater to regional diversity, DIL Servers have been strategically installed across different regions of India, ensuring state-specific information and local language support. Notably, the Disability Information Line Service is available 24/7, and during working hours, a dedicated call attendant is at hand to provide assistance. Recognizing the unique challenges posed by the COVID-19 pandemic, we had incorporated COVID-19 information access numbers into the IVRS system to serve as a valuable support service. During the reporting year, DIL received 55,504 calls, demonstrating its importance and reach, though slightly fewer than the 62,565 calls received in the preceding year of 2021-22. 7.8 Cross Disability Early Identification Cum Intervention Centre and Preparatory School

The vision for setting up the CDEIC is to offer cross disability early identification and intervention for the overall growth and development of divyangjan children below 6 years so as to promote inclusive education in the country. The CDEIC of Ali Yavar Jung National Institute of Speech & Hearing Disabilities was thus established in a collaborative manner with partial financial support from Mazagaon Dock Shipbuilders Limited, Mumbai under CSR . The centre is operational since 17th June, 2021 onwards.



At AYJNISHD(D), an exclusive wing is restructured and redesigned to make the place barrier free, attractive and child friendly. CDEIC offers various services like developmental screening, assessments of cognition, hearing, and speech and therapeutic management of divyangjan children in a child-friendly ambience. Besides having state of art equipment for audiological assessment and intervention, CDEIC has provision for speech therapy, occupational therapy, physiotherapy, behaviour modification, family education early educational intervention and preparatory classes for school readiness. Facilities of feeding rooms, disabled friendly toilets and family waiting rooms are also made at the centre. There is also a special toy and book library from which children can borrow books.



During the reporting year the centre served 340 children with hearing impairment, intellectual disability, autism spectrum disability, low vision, multiple disability and cerebral palsy and 76510 support services were provided. The centre conducted 12 parent empowerment programmes wherein 429 parents benefited.



8. IMPLEMENTATION OF ADIP SCHEME

The Government of India has consistently strived to ensure that 'Divyangjan', or persons with disabilities, have access to aids and appliances at affordable prices. Recognizing the pivotal role played by these aids and appliances in enabling the social, economic, and vocational rehabilitation of individuals with disabilities, this commitment has gained significant momentum, particularly with the enactment of the Persons with Disabilities (Equal Opportunities, Protection of Rights and Full Participation) Act, 1995, and the Rights of Persons with Disabilities Act, 2016.

Disabilities can significantly limit one's opportunities for leading a functionally productive life. In this context, the application of modern technology has given rise to a myriad of aids that can mitigate the impact of disabilities and unlock the economic potential of individuals with disabilities. For instance, wheelchairs, artificial limbs, crutches, braces, and splints can vastly improve the mobility of physically disabled individuals. Similarly, modern hearing aids have the capacity to empower those with residual hearing to engage in various daily activities. Moreover, cochlear implants offer children with hearing impairments the remarkable opportunity to hear and acquire the ability to speak. These advancements exemplify our unwavering commitment to enhancing the quality of life and opportunities for persons with disabilities in India.

The Scheme and its Objectives

The primary goal of the Scheme is to provide essential support to individuals with disabilities who require durable, sophisticated, and scientifically engineered aids and appliances. These aids and appliances serve as powerful tools in advancing their physical, social, and psychological rehabilitation by mitigating the impact of disabilities and unlocking their economic potential. As part of this scheme, the Institute, in collaboration with its regional centers, facilitates the distribution of hearing aids, both at its centers and through outreach camps, extending its services far and wide. In the spirit of transparency and accountability, we provide comprehensive information regarding the ADIP (Assistance to Disabled Persons for Purchase/Fitting of Aids & Appliances) grant-in-aid released, the statement of expenditure, and detailed beneficiary data for the year 2022-23. This information underscores our commitment to ensuring that individuals with disabilities have access to the aids and appliances they need to enhance their quality of life and achieve their full potential.

8.2 COCHLEAR IMPLANT: EMPOWERING PERSONS WITH HEARING DISABILITY USING MODERN TECHNOLOGY UNDER ADIP SCHEME & CSR INITIATIVE

AYJNISHD(D), Mumbai is the Nodal Agency for implementing Cochlear Implant (CI) surgery as well as post-surgical rehabilitation for children with hearing impairment as per revised ADIP scheme guidelines of Cochlear Implant, 2014. Loss of hearing impacts child's development of language and speech. The impact is much more severe if the loss is since birth. Such children having severe to profound hearing loss, even after the use of appropriate hearing aids, do not benefit from amplification and fail to develop adequate speech and language.

Cochlear Implant is a surgical procedure where the internal device consisting of receiver-stimulator and electrodes is implanted in the skull and fine electrodes are inserted in the cochlea. This is done by experienced ENT surgeons. After the surgical wound heals (takes 10 to 15 days), the external part of implant known as the processor is switched on. The switch-on is a process of synchronizing the external processor with the internal electrodes using computers.



After the surgery and switch-on, it is important to provide speech-language therapy by trained professionals such as Speech-Language Pathologists, Special Educators for children with hearing impairment or Auditory-Verbal Therapists so that children develop normal speech and language. This technology reverses the trend that deaf are "dumb". With this technology, deaf too can speak like any of us. Department of Empowerment of Persons with Disabilities (Divyangjan), Ministry of Social Justice & Empowerment, Govt. of India started providing Cochlear Implant under ADIP Scheme since 2014.



Subsequently, 219 hospitals across the country have been empaneled for Cochlear Implant surgery, resulting in the completion of 1,150 surgeries during the reporting year, marking the beginning of the rehabilitation journey for these individuals. For detailed insights into Cochlear Implant surgeries conducted under the ADIP Scheme, a state-wise list is provided below.

Now, 8 months post-implant, Raksha's progress is nothing short of remarkable. She has achieved the ability to communicate verbally at the phrase level, demonstrating an understanding of and response to commonly used verbal commands. Raksha has also taken the initiative to engage in self-communication with her parents, relatives, and friends, displaying curiosity by asking questions and making attempts to interact with everyone around her. Currently, she is enthusiastically attending an Anganwadi play school, paving the way for her continued growth and development. The dedication and motivation of Raksha's parents to collaborate in her speech and language development journey serve as a testament to the remarkable strides she has made and the bright future that lies ahead.

8.5.2. Mr. Rajan Gawade

The Divya Kala Mela, held at India Gate in New Delhi from December 2nd to December 7th, 2022, provided a platform for AYJNISHD (D) to create awareness and disseminate valuable information. With over 30 years of experience in his craft, Mr. Rajan Gawade not only creates artwork from Golden Grass but also excels in crafting decorative pieces using Thermocol. His proficiency extends to painting signboards and innovative interior

designing, where he offers consulting services. Throughout his journey, Mr. Rajan Gawade has not only honed his craft but has also played a vital role in guiding and providing employment opportunities to many individuals with hearing impairments, exemplifying his dedication to both his art and the community he serves.



This year AYJNISHD (D) had supported him to put a stall in Divya kala Mela 2022 organised by NHFDC from 2nd December, 2022 to 7th December, 2022 where he got wide coverage by media, many dignitaries like MP, MLA, common citizens and business head bought his artwork. He also received Best Stall Display Award at the Divya Kala Mela 2022 Event held in New Delhi from Dr. Virendra Kumar, Hon. Union Minister, Ministry of Social Justice and Empowerment, Govt of India.



9. ACTIVITIES IN NORTH EASTERN REGION

During the year 2022-23 following activities were undertaken for the empowerment of persons with disabilities in the North Eastern Region of the country. Mr. Navnath Jagdale, Vocational Instructor, Socio Economic Rehabilitation Dept., Mumbai is Nodal Officer and Mr. Anupam Das, Vocational Instructor and Mr. Prosenjit Mujumdar, Social Welfare Officer, Regional Centre, Kolkata are Joint Nodal officers of the North Eastern Programme.

9.1. Short Term Training Programmes

9.1.1. State Level Workshop for Cochlear Implantees



State level workshop for cochlear implantees was organsed at JNIMS, Manipur on 23rd and 24th March, 2023. 80 participants including cochlear implantees and their parents attended the programme.

Under CI-ADIP scheme, devices implanted were Digisonic (20 children), Cochlear (29 children) & Med-el (03 children). Med-el Implantees are functioning well. Cochlear children had few minor issues with the cable & processors. Digisonic had major number of problem requiring repair/ replace of processor, cable, magnets etc. All such issues were discussed and parents were orientated on care, maintenance and trouble shooting.

9.1.2. State Level Workshop on Cochlear Implants

State level workshop was organized on cochlear implants under ADIP scheme for empanelment of hospitals, rehabilitation professionals at Zoram Medical College, Mizoram on 27th and 28th March, 2023.



About 120 participants including ENT, Audiologists and Speech Language Pathologists, Audiometric Technicians, Special Educators, etc. attended the workshop.

9.1.3. Orientation cum Training Programme on Community Radio Broadcast



On November 3, 2022, a dynamic and informative Orientation cum Training program on "Community Radio Broadcast & Disability-Related Information" was successfully conducted. This collaborative initiative brought together Community Radio Association of India and the Department of Mass Communication at Rajiv Gandhi Central University, located in the scenic region of Rono Hills, Doimukh, Arunachal Pradesh. A diverse and engaged group of 50 participants, including Community Radio Professionals, Mass Communication Professionals, and students from the vibrant northeastern region, actively participated in this program. This event served as a valuable platform for sharing knowledge and fostering a deeper understanding of the crucial intersection between community radio and disability-related information.



9.1.4. Orientation cum Awareness Programme on Disabilities

Orientation cum Awareness Programmes were conducted at Mon, Nagaland on 25.06.2022, Imphal on 24.08.2022 to 25.08.2022 & Tengnoupal in Manipur on 14.01.2023. Total 211 persons benefited from these programmes comprising of Anganwadi Workers, ASHA Workers, SHG Leaders, Health Workers and Representatives of GOs and NGOs.

9.2. Diagnostic and Fitment Camps



AYJNISHD (D) organized four diagnostic and fitment camps at Kamrup, Assam state, Mon, Nagaland state and Tengnoupal, Manipur state benefiting 534 persons out of which 95 persons were fitted with 159 hearing aids under the ADIP Scheme.



10. OFFICIAL LANGUAGE IMPLEMENTATION

Brief description about Implementation of Official Language during the year 2022-23

- During the year under report 1783 & 2448 letters were issued in Hindi and English respectively.
 Total 223 documents were issued in bilingual under Official Language Act, 1963 Section 3 (3).
- During the reporting year meetings of Official Language Implementation Committee of the Institute were held on 30.6.2022, 06.10.2022, 06.01.2023 and 31.03.2023.
- On behalf of the Institute two TOLIC meetings were held in the month of June, 2022 and March 2023 which was attended by Hindi Officer. The TOLIC meeting was organized under the chairmanship of Directorate General of Shipping, Kanjur Marg (East), Mumbai.
- Department of Official Language, Ministry of Home Affairs, Government of India entrusted many important responsibilities with view to increase the progressive use of Hindi in official work of the Union and to ensure compliance of all statutory and legal provisions. As a part of these responsibilities, Hindi day have been organized every year on 14th September. For the first time Hindi Diwas and 2nd All India Official language Conference was organized at Surat, Gujarat on 14-15 September, 2022. Around 10,000 officials from various Ministries, Departments, Public Sector Undertakings and Autonomous Bodies were present at event. On behalf of AYJNISHD (D), Mumbai, Hindi Officer attended the event. Apart from above Hindi week was observed by the staff with enthusiasm from 16th to 21st September, 2022. During the week, Hindi section had organized various competitions, such as Hindi essay writing, writing poetry and slogan etc. to promote Official Language among the staff of the Institute followed by prize distribution.

12. Composite Regional Centre for Skill Development, Rehabilitation & Empowerment of Persons with Disabilities (Divyangjan), Bhopal

12.1 Introduction

Composite Regional Centre (CRC) for Skill Development, Rehabilitation & Empowerment of Persons with Disabilities (Divyangjan), Bhopal is a service model initiated by the Department of Empowerment of Persons with Disabilities (Divyangjan), Ministry of Social Justice & Empowerment, Govt. of India, established on 14th August, 2000, the Centre is functioning under the administrative control of Ali Yavar Jung National Institute of Speech and Hearing Disabilities (Divyangjan), Mumbai, since February,



2006. The Centre's building is National Award winner for Barrier Free Environment and is built on land measuring 3.63 acres and its plinth area is 1675 sq.mt.

CRC, Bhopal was established with the purpose to create infrastructure required for training and services for all categories of persons with disabilities of all ages. The Centre has professionals from medical, paramedical and rehabilitation disciplines to undertake and execute the following seven activities to serve all types of PwD as defined in the RPWD Act, 2016.

- Training Post Graduate Diploma and Diploma programs in disability rehabilitation
- ii. Short term training Orientation, Refresher, CRE and other programs
- iii. Services Centre based rehabilitation on multi/inter/trans disciplinary models
- iv. Parent and family support Parent training and empowerment programs
- v. Awareness About disability, empowerment, community support etc.
- vi. Outreach Camp and Community based rehabilitation
- vii. Research and Development appropriate to culture and social norms of Central India

12.5 Services

All categories of persons with disabilities are served at CRC, Bhopal. During the reporting year, the Centre served 1289 new clients, 9671 follow up clients and 29366 support services at the Centre and through camps. The Centre distributed/fitted 287 aids/appliances to 168 beneficiaries.

CRC-Bhopal is one of the first CRCs where early intervention has been in place for more than 2 decades. Among the beneficiaries include beneficiaries of Cross Disability Early Intervention Centre (CDEIC), Bhopal too that has served 469 new and 4298 follow up children below 6 years in the year 2022-23 by providing supportive services through multidisciplinary team of CRC-Bhopal.








13. Composite Regional Centre for Skill Development, Rehabilitation & Empowerment of Persons with Disabilities (Divyangjan), Ahmedabad

13.1 Introduction



The Composite Regional Centre (CRC) for Skill Development, Rehabilitation & Empowerment of Persons with Disabilities (Divyangjan), Ahmedabad, Gujarat was established on 16th August, 2011 and is functioning under the administrative control of AYJNISHD(D), Mumbai. At present it is functioning in the building allotted by the Govt. of Gujarat. Land has been acquired by CRC and construction of building is in progress. CRC, Ahmedabad has professionals from different disciplines to undertake and execute various rehabilitation activities.

13.2 Long Term Training Programmes

CRC, Ahmedabad conducts D.Ed. Spl.Edu. (IDD) course of two years duration affiliated by RCI, New Delhi. During the reporting year, 35 students were enrolled for this course.

13.3 Short Term Training Programmes/Webinars

In addition to the long term training programmes, CRC, Ahmedabad conducted short term training programmes/webinars for professionals in the area of disability rehabilitation, academic personnel, parents of children with disability, GOs and NGOs. The Centre organized Offline and online webinars and conducted short term training programs/webinars for professionals and personnel in GOs and NGOs.





14.1 Introduction

Composite Regional Centre (CRC) for Skill Development, Rehabilitation & Empowerment of Persons With Disabilities (Divyangjan), Nagpur is a service model initiated by the Department of Empowerment of Persons with Disabilities (Divyangjan), Ministry of Social Justice & Empowerment, Govt. of India, established on 13th October 2015 at Krida Prabodhini Hall, Yashwant Stadium, Dhantoli, Nagpur which is situated in nearly three kilometers from Nagpur Railway Station. Qualified professionals from various disciplines are offering rehabilitation services to Divyangjan



of all age groups. The Centre is functioning under the administrative control of Ali Yavar Jung National Institute of Speech and Hearing Disabilities (Divyangjan), Mumbai, since 1st May, 2020.

CRC, Nagpur is established with the purpose of offering clinical services , human resource development, research and providing medical, therapeutic, special educational and rehabilitation services to all categories of Divyangjan in those parts of the country where such infrastructure is lacking. Apart diagnostic activities, the centre undertake and execute the following activities:

- i. Occupational Therapy
- ii. Orientation & Mobility
- iii. Physical Medicine & Rehabilitation
- iv. Physiotherapy & Prosthetics & Orthotics
- v. Psychological and mental health services
- vi. Special Education support services
- vii. Speech & Hearing services





SEPARATE AUDIT REPORT OF THE COMPTROLLER & AUDITOR GENERAL OF INDIA ON THE ACCOUNTS OF ALI YAVAR JUNG NATIONAL INSTITUTE OF SPEECH AND HEARING DISABILITIES (DIVYANGJAN), MUMBAI FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 MARCH 2023.

We have audited the attached Balance Sheet of Ali Yavar Jung National Institute of Speech and Hearing Disabilities (Divyangjan), Mumbai (`the Institute') as at 31 March 2023, the Income & Expenditure Account and Receipt & Payment Account for the year ended on that date under Section 20(1) of the Comptroller & Auditor General's (Duties, Powers and Conditions of Service) Act, 1971. The audit has been entrusted for the period up to 2023-24. These financial statements include the accounts of the Institute's Regional Centres at Noida (Uttar Pradesh), Kolkata (West Bengal), Janla (Odisha), Secunderabad (Telangana), Training Centre for Adult Deaf (Hyderabad), Composite Training Centres at Ahmedabad, Bhopal and Nagpur and ADIP Scheme. These financial statements are the responsibility of the Institute's management. Our responsibility is to express an opinion on these financial statements based on our audit.

- 2. This Separate Audit Report contains the comments of the Comptroller & Auditor General of India (CAG) on the accounting treatment only with regard to classification, conformity with the best accounting practices, accounting standards and disclosure norms, etc. Audit observations on financial transactions with regard to compliance with the Law, Rules and Regulations (Propriety and Regularity) and efficiency-cum-performance aspects, etc., if any are reported through Inspection Reports/ CAG's Audit Reports separately.
- 3. We have conducted our audit in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in India. These standards require that we plan and perform the audit to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements are free from material misstatements. An audit includes examining, on a test basis, evidences supporting the amounts and disclosure in the financial statements. An audit also includes assessing the accounting principles used and significant estimates made by management as well as evaluating the overall presentation of financial statements. We believe that our audit provides a reasonable basis for our opinion.
- 4 Based on our audit, we report that :
- i. We have obtained all the information and explanations which to the best of our knowledge and belief were necessary for our audit.
- ii. The Balance Sheet, the Income & Expenditure Account and Receipt & Payment Account dealt with by this report have been drawn up in the format approved by the Government of India (Ministry of Finance) except for comments included in SAR.



iii. In our opinion, proper books of accounts and other relevant records have been maintained by the Institute as required under SI. No. 8 of the bye-laws in so far as it appears from our examination of such books.

iv. We further report that:

A Comments on Accounts

A.2 Assets

A 2.1 Fixed Assets (Schedule -8) ₹ 1591.49 lakh

As per Form 65 received from various CPWD divisions at Mumbai, Ahmedabad, Secundarabad, Bhopal and New Delhi as on 31/03/2023, expenditure incurred on capital works worked out to ₹926.42 lakh. As against this, addition to capital works in progress shown in Schedule-8 Fixed Assets was only ₹441.73 lakh. This has resulted in understatement of Fixed Assets by ₹484.69 lakh and over statement of Current Assets. Loans, Advances (Sch.11) to the same extent.

B. General Comments:

- **B.1** Annual accounts of Regional Centre (RC) at Janla and Noida showed that large amounts of closing balances were lying with these RCs (₹94.41 lakh at Janla and ₹110.28 lakh at Noida). However, RCs do not have an investment policy to gainfully invest unspent grant funds.
- **B.2** The Institute is maintaining the following three in-operative Saving Bank Accounts with Corporation Bank against various Endowment Funds:
- 1. Research Fund (52010121775566) ₹4.10 lakh
- 2. Foreign Contribution Fund (520101217775604) ₹7.68 lakh
- 3. Foreign Contribution Fund (New) (520281000388772) ₹3.26 lakh

Though a period of 10 years has lapsed, no action was taken either to close these accounts or refunding it to the respective funding agencies.

- **B.3** Under Schedule 11. Cash and Bank Balances of ₹1461.39 lakh included closing balance of ₹5.18 lakh against New Pension Scheme. However, as per the bank reconciliation statement as of 31.03.2023, the balance in the bank was showing only an amount of ₹2.46 lakh, indicating a difference of ₹2.72 lakh. This needs reconciliation.
- **B.4** Under Schedule 7- Current Liabilities & Provisions, no provision was made for Audit fees payable to CAG either in the consolidated Balance Sheet or in Balance Sheet of Composite Regional Centre, Ahmedabad.



- **B.5** Land admeasuring 22,320 sqm obtained by CRC, Nagpur on lease from the Collector, Nagpur for a nominal lease rent of ₹1 was shown as ₹1.94 lakh under Schedule 8 Fixed Assets. No reason was furnished for enhancement of cost by CRC. Nagpur.
- **B.6** The Institute has not made provision for retirement benefits such as pension, gratuity and leave encashment on actuarial basis in respect of eligible employees under Schedule-7- Current Liabilities and Provisions as required in terms of Accounting Standard 15 despite the same being pointed cut in previous SARs.
- **B.7** The Institute had paid property tax amounting to ₹55.10 lakh during the year 2022-23 pertaining to the years 2017-18 to 2021-22 and included the expenditure under Repairs and Maintenance (Schedule-21). However, no disclosure was made regarding this fact in Notes to accounts.

C. Grants in Aid

The Institute received grants-in-aid of ₹5,108.12 lakh (₹994.11 lakh – Capital, ₹1121.58 lakh – General, ₹2930.94 lakh - Salary and ₹61.49 lakh - Swachata Action Plan grant) and closing balance of 469.14 lakh from previous year (₹185.15 lakh - Capital, ₹235.63 lakh General, and ₹48.36 lakh - Salary) totaling to ₹5577.26 lakh during the year 2022-23. Out of this. the Institute utilized ₹5416.16 lakh (₹1044.25 lakh - Capital, ₹1325.26 lakh — General, ₹ 2985.16 lakh - Salary and NIL under Swachata Action Plan) leaving an unspent grant of ₹161.10 lakh. However, the utilization certificate of SAP grant shows utilization of ₹61.49 lakh. The Institute had an internally generated income of ₹ 369.52 lakh.

Further, the Institute had received grants-in-aid of ₹1490.77 lakh under the head Aids & Appliances (ADIP) during the year (which included GIA of ₹1212.84 lakh. recovery of ₹53.52 lakh from beneficiaries, interest income of ₹2.86 lakh and closing balance of ₹221.55 lakh from previous year). As against this, the Institute utilized a sum of ₹1307.86 lakh leaving an unspent balance of ₹182.91 lakh. However, as per the Utilization Certificate the unspent balance was shown as nil.

v. Subject to our observations in the preceding paragraphs, we report that the Balance Sheet and the Income & Expenditure Account/Receipt & Payment Account dealt with by this report are in agreement with the books of accounts.



- vi. In our opinion and to the best of our information and according to the explanations given to us, the said financial statements read together with the Accounting Policies and Notes on Accounts, and subject to the significant matters stated above and other matters mentioned in the Annexure to this Separate Audit Report, give a true and fair view in conformity with accounting principles generally accepted in India:
- (a) In so far as it relates to the Balance Sheet, of the state of affairs of the Ali Yavar Jung National Institute of Speech and Hearing Disabilities (Divyangjan), Mumbai as at 31 March 2023 and
- (b) In so far as it relates to the Income & Expenditure Account, of the surplus for the year ended on that date.

COMMENTS ON ACCOUNTS

- A. Balance Sheet
- A.2 Assets
- A.2.1 Fixed Assets (Schedule 8) ₹ 1591.49 lakh

The Institute accounts the expenditure on Fixed Assets / CWIP based on the statement received from CPWD till finalization of accounts of the Institute pertaining to respective years. The amount of additional expenditure incurred from the CPWD during the year 2022-23 is accounted as addition to Fixed Assets / CWIP. Accordingly, the amount of Rs. 4.41 crore expenditure by CPWD was accounted in the year 2022-23.

The CPWD submitted the statement in Form 65 for each of the project for which deposits are given and expenditure incurred till the month for which statement is submitted. The amount of Rs. 926.42 lakh submitted by audit is the cumulative expenditure incurred by CPWD from the period for which deposit given (may be prior to 2022-23) till March 2023 or work is completed. This expenditure is not only for the year 2022-23. The Institute accounts for the expenditure incurred by CPWD for each of the year separately after considering the expenditure already accounted in earlier year. Hence, there is no overstatement of Current Assets, Loans, advances (Sch. 11) or understatement of Fixed Assets.

B. General Comments:

- **B.1** The closing balance of grants in the year 2022-23 lying with RC, Janla, RC Noida and other Regional Centers are considered while preparation of budget for the year 2023-24 and the allocation of the grant to them in the year 2023-24. As on date there are no excess balance lying with the banks in RC Janla & RC Noida.
- **B.2** a) Research Fund (52010121775566) Rs. 4.10 lakh
 - b) Foreign Contribution Fund (520101217775604) Rs. 7.68 lakh
 - c) Foreign Contribution Fund (New) (520281000388772) Rs. 3.26 lakh

Separate bank accounts are maintained by the Institute for each type of specific grant. Since the grants are not utilized for various reasons, the said bank account is inoperative. The Institute is taking the efforts to utilize the said grants in the current financial year.



Since, we are intimated to grantees for surrender the foreign contribution funds, but no response from them. Hence, above the accounts are inoperative. As it is Foreign Contribution the compliance under FCRA needs to be done.

- **B.3** The reconciliation of bank account of New Pension Scheme is done. The bank balance as per the books is Rs. 5.18 lakh and the balance as per bank statement is Rs. 2.46 lakh. The reconciliation statement is enclose for your reference. (**Annexure I**)
- **B.4** Noted will be done in the year 2023-24 onwards.
- **B.5** CRC Nagpur was merged with the Institute from the year 2020-21. Prior to that it was a separate unit. The balance appearing in their books as on 31/03/2020 was consolidated with the Institute. The land value also as appearing in their books as on 31/03/2020 was consolidated.
- **B.6** The Institute is a non-profit organization working under the direction and the grants provided by the Govt. of India, Ministry of Social Welfare and Justice Empowerment. It is not a commercial organization and hence all the accounting standards not applicable to the Institute.

Annual budget is prepared in respect of Revenue expenditure towards salaries, gratuity, pension payable to the employees during the year is approved by the Ministry and the grants are released. There is no specific Budget Estimate approval for provision of Retirement Benefits payable in future as per actuarial valuation.

The retirement benefits / pensions has been reflected in the Budget Estimate during the year and the same was approved in Executive Council / General Council under the Pay Allowance / Pension.

B.7 Noted.

C. Grants in Aid

The statement of grant as per accounts of Institute including HQ, RC's and CRCs is accordance with the figure shown by the audit.

The actual unspent balance of ADIP grant is Rs. 182.91 lake the statement of expenditure of grants and there is no difference as compare with the statement of audit.
